**JANUARY 9, 2025**  
**REGULAR MEETING**

A Regular Meeting of the City Council was held in-person on Thursday, January 9, 2025, at 7:00 P.M. for the purpose of transacting any and all business. Notice of this meeting was posted on January 7, 2025, at 11:39 A.M. This meeting is being recorded and is live on S.A.T.V. and Zoom unless technological issues interrupt the transmission.

All Councillors were present.

Council President Prosniewski presided.

Councillor Varela moved to dispense with the reading of the record of the previous meeting. It was so voted.

President Prosniewski requested that everyone please rise to recite the Pledge of Allegiance.

**Salem City Council Land Acknowledgment**

The Salem City Council honors that this land is Naumkeag, or fishing place, where generations of Naumkeag people from the Pawtucket band of the Massachusetts Tribe lived and passed through for centuries.

We acknowledge that this is unceded Indigenous land and also acknowledge the Massachusetts Tribe, who continue to honor and hold this land into the present.

Salem's City Council is committed to having ongoing meaningful dialogue with the indigenous peoples who have presence in Salem in order to dismantle the legacies of oppression and inequities that persist today.

There was no public testimony.

**#4 – (#586 OF 2024) - NATIONAL GRID TO INSTALL CONDUITS ON UNION STREET**

A hearing was held on the order from National Grid to install Conduits on Union St., for service at 13 Hawthorne Blvd.

Sibhita Mahabier, representative for National Grid, 44 River St., Beverly, MA appeared in favor. This is needed to provide service to new condos going in at 13 Hawthorne Blvd.

Councillor Jerzylo stated she would grant with the following conditions that National Grid is to contact all homeowners if Union Street is to be closed or any driveways are to be blocked as well as having ample signage and to have police details if available.

No one appeared opposed.

Councillor Jerzylo moved to close the Public Hearing. It was so voted.

Councillor Jerzylo moved Granted with the above conditions. It was so voted.

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**(#545 of 2024) – APPOINTMENT OF MEGAN MONTGOMERY TO THE COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE**

**#14 – HOME RULE PETITION FOR AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF SALEM TO EMPLOY AUTOMATED ENFORCEMENT OF SPEED LIMIT VIOLATIONS IN DESIGNATED SCHOOL ZONES**

The following Order submitted by the Mayor was adopted by a roll call vote of 11 yeas, 0 nays and 0 absent.

**ORDERED:** That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill for authorization to employ automated enforcement of speed limit violations in designated school zones within the city of Salem as set forth below, be filed with an attested copy of this Order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2, as amended, of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that the following legislation be adopted, except for amendments by the Senate or House of Representatives which conform to the intent of this home rule petition:

**AN ACT** authorizing the City of Salem to employ automated enforcement of speed limit violations in designated school zones within the city of Salem.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court Assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:*

**AUTOMATED ENFORCEMENT OF SPEED LIMIT VIOLATIONS IN DESIGNATED SCHOOL ZONES WITHIN CITY OF SALEM**

**Section 1.** As used in this chapter, the following words shall, unless the context clearly requires otherwise, have the following meanings:-

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"Automated Road Safety Camera System" shall mean an automated motor vehicle sensor device installed which produces digital photographs and may record the speed of each motor vehicle at the time it is operated in a manner that is in violation of traffic laws and regulations where the automated road camera safety system is located.

"Camera Enforceable Violation" shall mean a violation of the traffic laws which may be enforced by an automated road safety camera system, limited to exceeding the speed limit pursuant to section 17 or section 18 of chapter 90 while travelling in a designated school zone.

"City" shall mean the City of Salem, Massachusetts.

"Designated School Zone" shall mean within 300 feet of the real property comprising a public or private accredited preschool, accredited Head Start facility, elementary, vocational or secondary school if the violation occurs between 5:00 a.m. and midnight, whether or not school is in session.

**Section 2.** (a) The City of Salem may employ an automated road safety camera system as a means of promoting traffic safety in a designated school zone, which may be fixed along any portion of any ways within a designated school zone its control, or within a designated school zone in the control of the commonwealth with written permission from the department of transportation and may impose a penalty on the owner of a motor vehicle for failure by the operator thereof to comply with traffic laws and regulations.

Councillor Morsillo thanked the Mayor for resubmitting this home rule petition. It has been submitted 6 years ago, 3 years ago, 2 years ago and now again today. This is to make it safer for our children. The owner of the vehicle will receive a ticket for going 10 or more miles over the speed limit.

Councillor Stott stated she is more hopefully this year it will get passed. Representative Cruz and Senator Lovely will help shepherd this through.

Councillor Cohen is also grateful to the Mayor for resubmitting this. Hopes this goes through quickly and hopes it becomes a moving violation.

Councillor Harvey agrees it should be a moving violation. His wife is a school bus driver and this is not just for the students but for the driver watching in horror the accidents or near misses.

Councillor Watson-Felt supports all that has been said but not enough. Hope this opens the door for more camera based enforcement for vehicle violations.

Councillor Varela asked through the President to Councillor Morsillo why only a ticket?

Councillor Morsillo replied that it is video evidence and not an officer pulling someone over after witnessing the violation. Not 100% conclusion that was the person. It is technically how the law is written. Only a ticket can be sent.

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Councillor Watson-Felt added camera enforcement in MA is not allowed as a means of enforcement.

**#15 – HOME RULE PETITION FOR AN ACT PROVIDING FOR PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF TAXES BY THE SOUTH ESSEX SEWERAGE DISTRICT IN THE CITY OF SALEM.**

The following Order submitted by the Mayor was adopted by a roll call vote of 11 yeas, 0 nays and 0 absent.

ORDERED: That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill as set forth below, be filed with an attested copy of this Order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2, as amended, of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that the following legislation be adopted, except for amendments by the Senate or House of Representatives which conform to intent of this home rule petition:

**AN ACT PROVIDING FOR PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF TAXES BY THE SOUTH ESSEX SEWERAGE DISTRICT IN THE CITY OF SALEM.**

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

**SECTION 1.** Section 7 of chapter 339 of the acts of 1925 is hereby amended by striking out the second paragraph, added by chapter 116 of the acts of 1993, and inserting in place thereof the following paragraph: -

Said district shall pay to the city of Salem an annual payment in lieu of taxes for all lands, facilities and other property of said district within said city in accordance with the following schedule: on July first, two thousand twenty-five the sum of six hundred thousand dollars; on July first, two thousand twenty-six the sum of seven hundred thousand dollars; on July first, two thousand twenty-seven the sum of eight hundred thousand dollars; on July first, two thousand twenty-eight the sum of nine hundred thousand dollars; on July first, two thousand twenty-nine the sum of one million dollars. Thereafter, on July first, commencing in two thousand thirty, the annual payment in lieu of tax payment to the city of Salem shall increase by the prior year's average increase in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers in the Boston area, but in no event less than two percent over and above the prior year payment. Such annual payments shall be assessed by the district against, and such assessment shall be paid by, all members of the district with the exception of the city of Salem, such payments to be apportioned among such members in the same ration as the yearly flow of sewage each such member bears to the yearly combined flow of sewage of the district.

**SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect as of the first day of July, two thousand twenty-five.

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The amount since 1993 has been \$500,000 with no adjustments for inflation. There has been \$6M in loss revenue. This petition gradually increases the annual payment. The Salem tax payers have been unfairly handing this burden.

Councillor Morsillo stated this right and just. Salem should collect a fair pilot. Three decades later we are on the losing side of an agreement. Salem bears the burden while the other communities reap the reward. Please contact Senator Lovely and Rep. Cruz to help get this passed.

Councillor Cohen stated he was at the last SESD board meeting. Senator Lovely and the Danvers Rep. was there. Acted either ignorant or upsent and I explained the unfair share paying for this facility.

**#16 - RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF MASSACHUSETTS' HEALTHY INCENTIVES PROGRAM**

The following Resolution introduced by Councillor Merkl was adopted by a roll call vote of 11 yeas, 0 nays and 0 absent

Resolution in Support Of Massachusetts' Healthy Incentives Program

WHEREAS: In Massachusetts, the Healthy Incentives Program (HIP) automatically applies to anyone who receives SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) benefits and allows them to receive limited reimbursement when they purchase local fruits and vegetables; and

WHEREAS: The Department of Transitional Assistance (DTA) announced on October 17th 2024 to HIP vendors that starting on December 1st montly reimbursements will be reduced to \$20 per household, regardless of household size from a variable \$40 to \$80 based on household size; and

WHEREAS: HIP serves as a critical tool in the fight against food and nutritional insecurity, which is pronounced among low-income Salem residents; and

WHEREAS: Vendors at the Salem Farmers' Market signed up for the HIP program rely on the sales that they receive with the support of programs like SNAP and HIP to sustain themselves; and

WHEREAS: HIP participation is up 19 percent as compared to last year and the need for state and local governments to support their residents' nutritional security is likely to increase if federal support decreases; and

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WHEREAS: The Salem City Council recognizes as its duty to advocate on behalf of our constituents who rely on these critical state-funded programs;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Salem City Council calls upon Governor Maura Healey, Senate President Karen Spilka, Speaker of the House Ron Mariano, Senate Ways and Means Chair, and House Ways and Means Chair to support the additional funds needed to fully fund HIP in a supplemental budget, and requests that our City Clerk forward a copy of this resolution to each of their offices as well as Salem's state delegation.

Councillor Merkl stated that Kerry Murphy approached her on this and that the Mayor also sent a letter to the state to support this. There are at least 15 HIP customers a week at the farmers market

Councillor Davis stated he recently learned that the program is being defunded and it is incredibly frustrating, so he appreciates this coming forward.

Councillor Varela stated when it comes to HIP and SNAP these programs are always on the verge of not being funded. People should reach out to the State to advocate for this. It is important for food security.

**#17 –ORDINANCE AMENDING ZONING RELATIVE TO BUSINESS NEIGHBORHOODS - (B1)**

The following ordinance introduced by Councillor Cohen was referred to the Planning Board to hold a Joint Public Hearing. (Councillor Varela recused himself from this matter) Councillor Harvey and Jerzylo were recorded as opposed.

In the year Two Thousand and Twenty-Five

An Ordinance to amend an ordinance relative to business neighborhood zoning

***Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem, as follows:***

**Section I.** Section 3.1 Table of Principal and Accessory Use Regulations of the Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended by:

- a. Replacing the “N” in the B1 zoning district column with a “BA” for two Commercial Uses, Commercial recreation and Indoor Restaurant, with service of alcoholic beverages.

**Section II.** This Ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter.

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Councillor Cohen is bringing this back for further review. There are over 20 B-1 Zones and some are in Ward 7. It's confusing why we have B-1 in the first place. We should go through the process again.

Councillor Stott is surprised to see this in front of us so soon since it's only been 100 days. Zoning is very confusing and we should look entire zoning. WE hashed this out for 4 months just 100 days ago.

Councillor Watson-Felt stated during the 4 month long journey 2% of parcels. Boundary lines very strange. This is a city-wide opportunity not to just look at one ward or one type of business but the zoning table itself . We should have a broader conversation.

**#18 – ORDINANCE AMENDING TRAFFIC CH. 42. SEC. 10 & 51 RELATIVE TO PIONEER TERRACE AND LAFAYETTE PLACE**

The following ordinance introduced by Councillor Cohen was adopted for first passage.

*In the year Two Thousand and Twenty-Five*

An Ordinance Relative to Traffic

*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem, as follows:*

**Section 1.** Section 10 of Article I be amended by inserting the following:

Pioneer Terrace – One Way Streets – from the intersection with the access road to 5 Pioneer Terrace to Lafayette Place, in a westerly direction.

**Section 2.** Section 51 of Article V be amended by repealing the following:

Lafayette Place – Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets – from the intersection of Green Street to the intersection of Pioneer Terrace. No parking any time. (12/5/80 DPW 5-1965)

Lafayette Place – Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets – southerly side. (9/6/68 DPW 5-115)

And inserting the following:

Lafayette Place – Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets – northerly side from the intersection of Salem Street and extending for approximately four hundred and sixty (460) feet to the intersection with Pioneer Terrace.

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Lafayette Place – Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets – southerly side from Lafayette Street to Green Street.

**Section 3.** This ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter.

Councillor Hapworth stated there is absolute chaos back there. U-turns are major issues. Almost saw two kids get hit.

**#19 – ORDINANCE AMENDING TRAFFIC CH. 42. SEC. 50 – HANDICAP PARKING – JEFFERSON AVENUE**

The following ordinance introduced by Councillor Varela was adopted for first passage.

*In the year Two Thousand and Twenty-Five*

An Ordinance Relative to Traffic, Ch. 42, Sec. 50B – Handicapped Zones, Limited Time

*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem, as follows:*

**Section 1.** Section 50B – Handicapped Zones, Limited Time shall be amended by adding the following:

Jefferson Avenue – One Handicap Parking space in front of #326 Jefferson Avenue, for a distance of twenty (20) feet;

And also adding:

Jefferson Avenue – One Handicap Parking space in front of #338 Jefferson Avenue, for a distance of twenty (20) feet

**Section 2.** This ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter.

**#20 – APPROPRIATION OF \$180,000.00 – FY2025 CPA FUNDS FOR OLD TOWN HALL EXTERIOR RESTORATION**

The following order introduced by Councillor Merkl was adopted.

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**(#568) SECOND PASSAGE – ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2 – COUNCIL ON AGING**

The Second Passage of Ordinance Amending Chapter 2 – Council on Aging was then taken up. It was adopted for second and final passage.

*In the year Two Thousand and Twenty-four*

An Ordinance relative to the Council on Aging

*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem, as follows:*

**Section I.** Chapter 2, Article IV, Division 7. *Council on Aging* is hereby amended by replacing the words “council on aging” with the words “council on aging and senior services” as they appear in Sections 2-831 through 2-836.

**Section II.** Chapter 2, Article XV *Senior Property-owner Tax Work Off Abatement Program, Sec. 2-2052 Program guidelines* is hereby amended by replacing the words “council on aging” with the words “council on aging and senior services” as it appears in this section.

**Section III.** Chapter 2, Article IV, Division 7, Sec. 2-836 *Director of the Council on Aging* is hereby further amended by adding the words “develop and implement programming that supports seniors and” immediately after the words “who shall” as it appears in this section.

**Section IV.** This ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter.

**Section 1.** Sec. 2-146. - City annual report is hereby amended as follows:

Replacing “May 1<sup>st</sup>” with “June 1<sup>st</sup>”

And adding the following new paragraph:

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A second report shall be presented to the council no later than March 1st of each year reporting on details related to the Halloween tourism season, including receipts, expenditures and other details deemed relevant to the month of October.”

**Section 2.** This ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter
